- **s.12: Procurement Objectives**

- *“In carrying out a covered procurement, contracting authorities must have regard to the importance of [...] **maximising public benefit**”*
- Lord True: ‘public benefit’ is *“how public money can achieve additional benefit in the way that the contract is delivered, which would include how to maximise social value”*.

- **s.13: The national procurement policy statement**

- **National procurement statement** will set out the Government’s *“strategic priorities in relation to procurement”*.
- *“A contracting authority must have regard to the national procurement policy statement”*.
